

When is the right time to apply?

The earlier you start your application, the better! The further you can stay away from a deadline, the more we can help you put your best foot forward. Plus, many programs have rolling admissions, which means they can fill guickly and often before the deadline.

Can I work in Canada after I graduate?

All the programs OzTREKK features are recognized in Canada. We can help you understand the licensing process specific to your profession and to your province. Depending on your program, it could be as simple as filing paperwork or as complicated as taking additional studies and exams. We'll walk you through the process before you make your decision to study in Australia to make sure it's right for you.

How does OzTREKK know if my application will be competitive?

Most Canadians applying to full-degree programs in Australia (i.e., not study abroad courses, which usually only last a semester or two) apply through OzTREKK. They're studying medicine, dentistry, law, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, veterinary medicine....

Each year, we receive thousands of applications. We know what it takes to not only be eligible, but also competitive. That's why OzTREKK students have some of the highest offer rates of all international applicants.

Applying from High School

While North American universities don't offer undergraduate-entry professional degrees, they're quite common in other parts of the world-including Australia, a place known for its world-class universities and forward-thinking approach to teaching and learning.

Bonus? These degrees lead to recognized qualifications, so you'll be eligible for licensing to practice in Canada. After graduating and becoming licensed, Canadians have the option to practice in either Australia or Canada.

You don't have to wait. Your first steps toward a career in medicine, dentistry, law, physio, vet, or pharmacy can begin right after high school. OzTREKK can help you with any undergraduate program!


OzTREKK Student Profile

Programs

Getting into the right program

From medicine and dentistry to audiology and zoology, OzTREKK is here to help you pursue your dreams. If you don't see your area of interest here, just reach out. We have yet to encounter a student goal that our partner universities could not meet!

Study areas

Architecture and design, arts and humanities, audiology and speech pathology, business and management, chiropractic, dentistry, law, health and exercise sciences, medicine, nursing, occupational therapy, optometry, pharmacy, physiotherapy, public health, research, STEM, teaching, veterinary medicine



Which program is the best fit for you? At OzTREKK, we know where you're most likely to get an interview or offer based on your GPA or admissions test, or which course is going to meet that human anatomy prerequisite. We also provide backup program options you may not have considered.





Glossary of Terms

GPA: Grade point average, generally on a point-based scale, based on grades from courses completed.

cGPA: Cumulative grade point average based on all courses completed within your degree.

wGPA: Weighted GPA, giving certain credits more weight than others, typically based on the year they were completed.

Application deadline: Last date that OzTREKK can submit your application to the university for a specific program. OzTREKK displays North American dates, so you won't miss a deadline.

Final transcript: After graduating, a transcript will confirm that the degree was awarded and will list the final grades for all courses. This is necessary to receive a full offer for most programs, and sometimes to apply.

Application Cycle

What should you expect when applying to study in Australia or New Zealand?

2 years before you graduate

Review program options on oztrekk.com.

Contact OzTREKK to get a list of prerequisites, so you can register for any courses you need.

1 year before you graduate

Review the OzTREKK program admissions guide so you're up to date with the latest admissions criteria. Check in with OzTREKK to ensure you're on track with prereqs, grades, tests, etc.

Attend OzTREKK webinars and in-person events to get a feel for studying Down Under and your university options, plus meet university representatives, alumni, and other students considering studying in Australia or New Zealand.

Semester before you graduate

Fill out your OzTREKK application. Submit any necessary documents. Attend more OzTREKK events. Talk to your family about financing (if you haven't already) and to prepare them for the idea of moving. We're always happy to chat with parents.

Stages of the Application Process


OzTREKK is here to support you through every "stage" of the application and acceptance process.

Inquiry Stage - Connect with OzTREKK to find a program that "fits"

Learn about the programs you're interested in. Contact us, read the website, check out Instagram, ask your friends. Do it all. This is a no-commitment phase, so have a good "think" about whether studying abroad gives you some butterflies!

Started Stage - Starting your application and getting your documents in

Every year tens of thousands of applications are started. Once you start your OzTREKK application, it will come to our office where we will review all information and set up a file for you. You'll receive a detailed list of all application requirements, and we'll get to work on preparing everything for the universities on your behalf.



Applied Stage - OzTREKK submits your complete application(s) to the universities

Your student advisor will give you access to helpful resources for your program(s) while you play the waiting game! This period can be nerve-wracking, but as soon as we hear anything, you'll always be the first to know.

Offer Stage - What happens when you get a letter of offer

Congratulations! First, take a minute to enjoy this. You've worked hard to get here, and you should feel proud. It's a big deal.

Next, it's time to figure out how this will work. This is your journey, and you need to be comfortable with it. If you choose to continue, in this stage you'll pay your deposit, sign some documents, and officially become a student at your university!

Accepted Stage - After you accept an offer letter

Once the university processes your acceptance you will receive a Confirmation of Enrollment. This is the official security that you are "in"—you have a seat in the program. By this time, you'll be excited and nervous all at once. It's fun, enjoy it!

Study Stage - Advice for when you're there



Working In Canada After Graduation

When you apply through OzTREKK, we make sure you understand how to use your degree in Canada. Here are the basics of what to expect. Visit our <u>Licensing page</u> for more information.

Program	Licensing Process to Practice in Canada
Medicine	Pass the MCCQE1 exam and NAC OSCE (generally taken in final year of med school); apply to CaRMS; and complete residency in your specialty.
Dentistry	Pass the NDEB exams.
Law	Have credentials assessed by the NCA and complete requested exams (most students will need to complete 5 examinations in Canadian law); and complete an articling position or LPP program.
Veterinary Medicine	Register with the National Examining Board (NEB); write the NAVLE; apply for license in your province.
Physiotherapy	Complete Context of Physio Practice in Canada course + 1025 clinical hours for provincial registration; apply to CAPR; and pass the PCE.
Occupational Therapy	Apply to ACOTRO's Substantial Equivalency Assessment System; complete 1000+clinical hours in a program; pass NOTCE exam; register in your province.
Chiropractic	Complete three Canadian Chiropractic Examination Board exams and register in your province.
Pharmacy	Register in the Pharmacists Gateway. Pass the Pharmacist Evaluating Exams; apply to your province; and complete the defined Structured Practical Training.
Speech Pathology & Audiology	Complete the required number of clinical and subject hours for your major and minor; pass Canadian Entry to Practice exam and register in your province.
Teaching	Graduates of Master of Teaching programs must have completed a defined number of practicum days; register in your province.
Nursing	Apply to the National Nursing Assessment Service and write the NCLEX. Register in your province.
Public Health	There is no need to register with an accrediting body in Canada or complete any further schooling.
Optometry	Have credentials assessed by the Federation of Optometric Authorities of Canada (FORAC), take the Internationally Graduated Optometrist Evaluating Exam, and pass the OEBC exam. You may be required to take the Advanced Standing Optometry Preparatory Program.

For me, studying abroad was the opportunity of a lifetime to simultaneously pursue my dreams while exploring a city that very few get to truly experience in the time and the detail it deserves. When you are spoiled with beautiful weather and so many delicious food options every single day, the years spent away from home pass by in no time at all.

There was never a dull moment in Sydney and there's no better place to study abroad than Australia. I vividly remember the awe of seeing the university for the first time. Now that it's all said and done, I still reminisce about all the good times spent overseas and all the great memories made with incredible friends during dental school.

Since dental degrees earned in Australia are equivalent to those obtained in Canada, the transition was seamless, and the hardest part about returning home to work was honestly just the long international flight and learning to endure the cold Canadian winters again!

I absolutely loved my time in Australia! My favourite part of the program were the practical components—both in school and during placement. I was surprised how medical it was, in the best way. We learned so much detail and knowledge. I felt so informed and prepared, especially within our hospital placements, which I loved so much. They made me feel like a valuable member of the team.



Traveling Australia is incredible. We took multiple camper van trips up both sides of the coast, which I would highly recommend, as all camp sites are so well-equipped for this kind of travel. I was surprised to see how many different climate zones there are and so close together. You can drive on one highway, see rain forest on one side and the beach on the other!

I currently work at a private practice in Toronto, seeing both orthopedic and pelvic health clients. Australia's knowledge around pain science has really helped me build connection and rapport with my clients, which ultimately helps with the success of their treatment outcomes.





Money Matters

Cost of living

Getting into your dream profession is a big investment of your time and resources, so it's important to ask yourself how much you're willing/able to pay for it.

On top of tuition, international students can expect to pay AUD\$25,000 - AUD\$30,000 per year in living expenses, depending on the city and living arrangements. The average international student in Australia spends approximately AUD\$500+ per week on living expenses, but this depends on the location, as cities like Melbourne, Sydney, and Brisbane are more expensive. Check out the cost-of-living calculator and comparison tool to get a better idea.

How do OzTREKK students pay for their studies?

OzTREKK students typically finance their studies using

- professional student lines of credit via a Canadian bank;
- · Canadian government student loans; and
- personal / family savings.

Professional student line of credit

Canadian banks have student lines of credit available to Canadians studying internationally. Students are required to have a co-signer, so be prepared to ask a family member to act as a guarantor.

Student loans

Canada's "List of Designated Educational Institutions" includes all OzTREKK's Australian universities. Most students are eligible for a government student loan.

Canadian government student loans provide funding based on demonstrated financial need. The Canada Student Loans Program provides up to \$210 per week of full-time study per loan year for students studying internationally. Most provinces grant additional loans.

It's important to remember that most provincial loan offices do not release money until after the student has arrived in Australia and classes have commenced.

Scholarships

OzTREKK's university partners offer a variety of scholarships, but they are limited and competitive. We recommend students plan to fund their studies via other sources and consider the scholarship as a bonus.

Transferring Your Money

After you've paid your initial deposit via your university's preferred method of payment (recommended), you'll want to look into the most cost-effective ways to transfer money for the remainder of your payments.

There are a ton of other money-transfer companies out there. OzTREKK will help you figure out which one might be best for you.

It is important to keep an eye on the exchange rates as you can save thousands of dollars by watching. Even a fluctuation of 1% - 2% can mean significant savings when you consider the total cost of your degree.



Predeparture Preparation

Okay, so you've successfully submitted your acceptance to study Down Under and you've got your Confirmation of Enrollment (CoE).

Now what?

You're officially in what we call the "predeparture" stage. We're here to make sure you're organized and prepared by providing you with heaps of predeparture information, so you'll be ready to move to Australia or NZ.



We'll set you up with our handy Student Checklist, our Students' Facebook group, and our Student Contact List. You'll have exclusive access to predeparture events like our accommodation webinars and in-person Predeparture Meet & Greets. We also have a Parents' Network on Facebook to ensure parents have a place to chat and ask questions.

Student Visa

After you've accepted an offer, you should apply for your student visa at least 8 weeks before your program starts.

OSHC

All Canadians need to buy OSHC for themselves and any visa dependents for the duration of the degree before they can apply for a student visa.

Visa health check

Many students who will undertake clinical placements in a state health facility as part of their degree will be asked to complete a health check with a panel doctor as a condition to receive their visa.

OzTREKK Meet & Greet

Accepted students have the chance to meet before their programs start. Great place to meet fellow OzTREKKers!

Student Contact List

All students with a CoE are invited to add their name and contact info to our OzTREKK Student Contact List for the year. It's a great way to connect with future classmates (or potential roommates!).

Clinical placements

Some programs involve placements in clinical facilities where you will interact with patients. You'll need to complete state health requirements (inoculations, etc.).

Police check

You'll may need to obtain a National Police Check from the Australian Federal Police, in addition to a criminal record check from your home country.

Accommodation

Choose from homestay, on-campus residences, privately managed student housing, or private rental market.

Financing

OzTREKK students typically finance their studies using professional student lines of credit, Canadian student loans via the government, and personal/family savings.

Banking

The four big banks are NAB, CBA, ANZ, and WBC. Pick one with an ATM near campus or your accommodation.

Flights

Make sure to consider layovers when getting a great deal on a flight. It's already a long trip!

Tax file number (TFN)

Apply online after you get to Australia if you will be earning money or collecting interest in an Australian bank account.

Student visa

To study in Australia, you must obtain a student visa from the Australian Government (Department of Home Affairs).

Your student visa grant notification will be emailed to you by the Australian Government. Save this email and print out a copy of the notification email and take it with you in your carry-on luggage to Australia. You can always log in to your IMMI account to see the status of your application.

Don't forget! The Australian or New Zealand government will digitally attach your CoE to your passport; you won't receive a hard copy.

Health exams

At the end of your online visa application session, you will be notified if you are required to have a health exam performed by a panel doctor. Not all programs require a health check.

If you are required to do a medical exam/health check, it must be done by a "panel doctor" in Canada who has been approved by the Australian High Commission.

Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

As an international student, it is a condition of your visa that you have Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the duration of your stay in Australia.

OSHC is required so international students have access to the same medical and hospital care as all Australians. As an international student, you must maintain OSHC for the entire duration you are in Australia. If you are taking any dependents (e.g., spouse/partner and children younger than 18 years old), they must be covered as well.

You can purchase coverage via your university when you accept your offer, or directly from an OSHC provider. We will help.

Taking a partner or family

Eligible family members include your spouse/partner and your dependent children. A spouse is defined by the Australian Government as the person you are married to, or in a de facto (common law) relationship with. A person is the de facto partner of another person (whether of the same sex or a different sex) if the following is true:

- They have a mutual commitment to a shared life to the exclusion of all others.
- The relationship between them is genuine and continuing.
- They live together or do not live separately and apart on a permanent basis, and they are not related by family.

You must declare all family members on your application, even if they do not plan to travel with you to Australia.

Taking pets

You can bring your cat or dog into Australia under strict import conditions, which include immunizations and quarantine. As Australia is an island country, these conditions help safeguard Australia's agriculture, environment, native and domestic animals, and people.

Canada and the USA are considered "Group 3" countries, which are described as approved countries and territories in which rabies is absent or well-controlled and animals from these countries require an import permit to be eligible for import to Australia.

Working in Australia or New Zealand

After you've started your course of study, you can work up to 48 hours every 2 weeks (starting on a Monday) when your course is in session. You may work unrestricted hours during your study breaks or more than 48 hours per fortnight if the work is part of your course (i.e., it is a registered part of your course that is mandatory).

Students completing a master's degree by research, or a doctoral degree (PhD) don't have any work restrictions.

Sounds great, right? Just keep in mind that the money earned is not to be your only source of income for tuition or living expenses. Many students find it difficult to have time for a job.

In New Zealand, you may be eligible to work up to 20 hours per week if you are completing a full-time course that is at least 2 academic years in length or results in a New Zealand qualification that gains points under the Skilled Migrant Category.

Accommodation

On campus

On-campus residences can be individual bedrooms or shared bedrooms with shared facilities. Often referred to as "colleges," they include meals, furniture, internet, programming, and support. OzTREKK recommends on-campus accommodation for all high-school leavers.



Off campus, student-specific

Student-purposed apartments are like on-campus colleges and may be booked in advance. These are usually fully furnished and managed by a private company. Students are self-sufficient, although it may be possible to purchase meal plans. Students are usually responsible for connecting and paying for utilities such as water, telephone, electricity, and gas in their own name and at their own cost.

Off campus, private rental market

People in a shared household usually lease their property through a real estate agent. Students should be prepared to visit at least 5-10 places. This can be the least expensive option when shared with roommates.

Homestay

The student lives with a family, couple, or single person/s in their own home. Homestay arrangements generally fall within one of the following categories: full board, part board, and board in exchange.

Under 18

Application and offer processes

Depending on the university, additional forms and steps will be required during the application process. Students may also have additional steps to accept an offer should they receive one.



Living with a guardian in Australia

Any international student younger than 18 years at commencement must live with an approved guardian until they turn 18.

Guardian visa requirements

If the student does not already have an approved guardian in Australia, they may need a family member to apply for a guardian visa to accompany them. This guardian visa should be obtained as part of the student visa application process.









Arrival

Most Australian universities offer airport reception, which takes students from the airport to their accommodation. The service is often free for international students, but for a fee, the service can also be arranged to include non-student family members.

After arrival

- Set up phone
- Find a place to stay / live
- Finalize enrollment and pick up your student card
- Complete clinical placement requirements (if applicable)
- Attend orientation and connect with others for support
- Start school
